### Walsh County Heritage Village

It has been a busy year at Heritage Village this year. We started off with Life Line Screening at the village on April 18, 2017. We held a walleye fish fry on April 28, 2017. We had donations of three fryers to help keep up with frying fish, rummage sales, 50th anniversary party, Transystems Job Fair, SummerFest, Valley Cruisers Car Club, wedding at the Landstad Church along with a reception in the theatre building, Farmers Market throughout the summer, fish fry in November, Shop with Santa in December.



We were so blessed in July to have a 42x70 Morton building donated to us by Olaf and Frances Aasand in memory of Hank and Lila Monson. We will be bringing in Uncle Sig's tractors in the summer of 2018 to be housed in this building among other items. Again, thank you to the Aasands for their donation.

The village has been open this winter for remodeling. The main theatre building has been all repainted, flags washed and cleaned up, coat of arms all washed and Karen Anderson repainted about eight of those, new ceiling fans installed, all new lights in the kitchen, new fire extinguishers, exit lights repaired, floors stripped, washed and waxed by Demester Commercial Cleaning, all cupboards in the kitchen washed out and rearranged, lots of items for rummage. Thank you to everyone who helped in any way with this project.

Other projects at the village this summer are installing ADA (handicapped accessible doors) at the building, total cost around \$10,000. Two floors, one in the Nash Finch building and one in the General Store are caving in and need to be repaired, cost of around \$2,000 per floor; Mandt Hall (print shop) has a sinking floor to be repaired, cost of around \$2,000 and also repairs to the front deck and stairs for around \$2,000; cook car needs to be resided with steel siding (about \$2,000); store fronts on Sig's buildings need repair (\$2,500); bell tower on school needs to be rebuilt (\$1,000); depot needs windows painted, foundation repair, extend the ramp and install railing (about \$5,000); windows, doors and siding repairs to the post office; new door and siding to the jail; paint the caboose; paint the entire bottom portion of the main theatre building; repairs to the Shoults house; concrete floor in the Morton building (\$20,000). Thank you to the county for the bridge planks to repair the bridge.


Also, plans are to have a display pad with a gravel base to display the rest of Uncle Sig's machinery that will remain outside.

Daryl Campbell is also on the Veterans Memorial Board. They are currently working on locating the Veterans Memorial on the grounds of Heritage Village to the south facing the highway. This is an extensive project and is about two years out in the making. More information on this at a later date.

We received several donations in 2017 and are very greatful for that. Thank you to everyone who donated monies or who volunteered in any way to help us this past year.

City Shoe Shop

In the summer of 2018 we will be moving in a garage from Uncle Sig's, pouring a concrete floor and some repairs to the building. This will be made into a shoe shop which will house shoe repair equipment, sewing machines, saddles, harnesses, and leather goods.

Following is a bit of history on the shoe shop. The cost of this project is around \$10,000. If there is anyone interested in funding this project or any donations towards it would be greatly appreciated. Article on the shoe shop below. Also Dennis and Nancy Ganyo bought the city shoe shop in 1982 or 1983 from Mr. and Mrs. Henry Bolek. They closed it in 1990.

#### City Shoe Shop

Before Mr. Franklin Goodman started in the shoe repair business, he served as an apprentice to a Mr. Lindemoen who operated a shoe repair shop in a small building in the area of 600 block Hill Avenue.

Franklin bought the business from Lindemoen and operated a shop in that same spot for a short while.

In the early 1950's, Franklin Goodman, as original owner of City Shoe Shop moved to another small building located at 38 W. 6th Street. This building was sold so another move was necessary. The shoe repair business finally located in a converted government granary with an addition attached to the north side of it for Mr. Goodman's shoe repair machinery. This building was moved in 1981 south of the residence of the Goodman family at 1207 Hill Avenue. Along with shoe repair, a canvas and tarp repair business was also instituted. The business continued here for many years until, due to ill health, the business was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Bolek in January 1973. On December 30, 1979, after operating the business in this area for six years, the Boleks moved to 209 East 6th Street where they still carry on the business of shoe repair and tarp and canvas repair.

### A Bit About the Officers of Heritage Village

President: Ken Hoffmann became president after six years as vice president under Dr. Harold Blanchard, who took ill and passed away in 2012. One of the many duties first and foremost is the preservation and care of the artifacts entrusted to us through donations. This is part of our heritage and must be preserved for our future generations. Other duties include, but are not limited to, funding for the village for the everyday maintenance and upkeep. Many of the buildings have been at the village since the 1970s and are in dire need of doors, windows, siding, painting and general repair. This is done through grants that are available as well as sending letters asking for donations. We also have fundraisers such as breakfasts, fish frys, SummerFest lunch, lunches during Farmers Market and whatever else comes up. These are all the ways we try to raise money to maintain the village.

Vice President: Gordon Bracken became vice president around 2005 under the direction of Dr. Harold Blanchard. Gordy worked along with Harold on the grounds, setting up tours, etc. Gordy loved to give tours to the schoolchildren and also loves to work in the saloon during SummerFest selling BBQ's and sasparilla. He has also been involved in riding in the parade for Heritage Village during SummerFest. He volunteers wherever he can help.

Secretary: Linda Restemayer became secretary of Heritage Village Board in 2016. Her duties are to record minutes of every meeting and present them at our board meetings. Linda does an excellent job in her position. Thank you for your excellent work and all the volunteering you do.

Office Manager/Treasurer: Verna Aasand joined Heritage Village in February of 1990 as a gaming employee, under the direction of Jake Jacobson. In 2005 she became gaming manager, office manager of the village, treasurer of the board, under the direction of Dr. Harold Blanchard. Heritage Village closed their gaming activities in April of

2009 due to a decline in the gaming clientele. Verna oversees a lot of the day to day activities under the direction of current board president Ken Hoffmann. Verna is responsible for maintaining the bookkeeping and making sure finances are available for the projects that come up, payroll, payroll taxes, prepares monthly financial reports, balances bank statements, compiles worker's comp, job service reports, annual Secretary of State reports, prepares grants, prepares 990 non-profit financial for lawyer to file return with IRS, sends thank you cards, prepares letters for donations, schedules events at the village, volunteers around the village making labels, painting, assists groundskeeper outside when he gets behind, sets up for rummage sales, takes care of purchasing for fundraisers for the village and with the help of the board members prepares and serves the meals, lunches for Farmers Market, and many other tasks too numerous to mention.

Verna is beginning her 28th year at Heritage Village. Hopefully if health cooperates she can continue for a few more.

Groundskeeper: With excitement and enthusiasm, Les Aasand jumped at the chance to be groundskeeper at Heritage Village in the spring of 2005 under the direction of Dr. Harold Blanchard. His knowledge of equipment and the love for outdoors sparked his interest in this position. He will be starting his 13th year in the spring of 2018. Les thrives on areas of improvement which has brought him to using more Roundup and all new up-to-date equipment.

# Walsh County Historical Museum



The theme of 2017 was repairs, repairs! 
Our museum will have a few new faces on the board. Dexter Sitzer will replace Ron Ophaug, and Shannon Brazil will become co-curator.
