Historical Tour of Grafton Carnegie Library

This is an overview of the program given to the Walsh County Historical Society in March 2015.



Grafton Carnegie Library

n North Dakota, 13 Carnegie libraries were built between 1901 and 1916. Of the eight public libraries only three are still in use as such. Of the three academic libraries, one is gone and the other two currently have other uses (at NDSU and UND).


The Carnegie Foundation had three requirements for receiving funding. The need for a library in that area had to be assessed, a location secured and a commitment of annual funding for library expenses equivalent to the grant had to be approved.

The Grafton library received a \$10,000 grant and was completed in 1905.

Grafton's library was designed by Joseph Bell DeRemer, architect from Grand Forks, who designed many other sites such as the School for the Blind (Bathgate), a school building in Park River, and a building named for him at Grafton's Developmental Center.

The library has several chairs purchased by the Ladies Columbian Club. They were hand-carved by Walsh County resident Matt Vlasik. Each chair has a special theme, such as a buffalo and a sheaf of wheat. They were on display at the Columbian Exposition of 1893 in Chicago.

A wooden-case clock from the Waterbury Clock Company was presented to the library by Walter Stockwell. Stockwell was a notable educator, serving as superintendent of Grafton, head of Department of Public Instruction in Bismarck and one of the founders of Northern School Supply.

The library has glass bookcases for frequently used local history resources and early North Dakota history.

Those wishing to do genealogical research may want to use Ancestry.com. A wide number of magazines are available online. These services are both free, just ask at the desk.









She would then take this "doll buggy" to various events and exhibitions, opening her doll collection up for the public to see.

Ora Marie Stewart passed away on April 3, 2010, thus bringing to an end the wonderful times people in the area had seeing her doll collection and taking a trip back in time as they remembered dolls from their childhood. It seems all women can remember dolls of their childhood, even if they are not on display for others to see and appreciate. 
